On January 14, the Biden administration announced that it will begin shipping \$200 million worth of military arms, supplies, and equipment to Ukraine to help Ukraine protect itself from Russian invasion.

- 255,000 active military personnel

About the 80 tons of ammunition

Assume that this 80 tons is all small arms ammunition for NATO 5.56 rounds

1 ton = 907185 grams 80 tons = 72,574,800 grams

1 NATO round = 12.31 grams 80 tons = 5,895,598 rounds

280,000 soldiers = 21 rounds/soldier 150,000 combat ready = 39 rounds/soldier

According to DOD statistics, during the Vietnam the war it is estimated that 50,000 rounds of ammunition were used for every enemy combatant that was killed. For Iraq, the estimate is about 60,000 rounds.

IMHO there is no doubt that Biden has not provided the Ukrainian army with enough ammunition for even a week. This Biden move is nothing more than all his other actions which were made to make him look good but in the end resulted in tragedy for those involved.
